Sean Smith's Presentation (October)

In Japan, most formal bonsai displays are presented in a Tokonoma which is an indoor area used for displaying precious art objects. Tokonoma's may vary in size, shape, and layout, but are always raised above the level of the floor.

The display of objects within the Tokonoma is generally either a 2-point or a 3-point display. A hanging scroll, or kakejiki, may be one part of either of these. Scrolls are used to bring the outdoors inside, to suggest a season or a location, and/or to tell a story.

Placement of objects in a Tokonoma is meant to give the viewer's mind some exercise. Empty space is part of the aesthetic of the presentation within a Tokonoma, as are perspective and movement.

Like bonsai, scroll-making came to Japan from China, and was embraced and refined by Japanese artists. However, while apprenticing to a bonsai master requires a 5-year commitment, apprenticing to a scroll-maker is 15-year commitment.

There are 3 types of scrolls: formal, semi-formal, and informal. An informal scroll should not be used in a formal Tokonoma. A formal Tokonoma should, ideally, be changed morning, noon and night every day of the year!

Every scroll-maker uses glue that is made from wheat flour - the same kind of glue that has been used since the beginning of the art of scroll-making. The process of cutting and gluing together the many individual pieces of paper that comprise each traditional scroll takes several days, including drying time. Experts can recognize the work of different scroll-makers by the proportions of the different parts of a finished scroll.

It's hard to believe, but there are no set rules about the size of scrolls. The finished size of the scroll depends on the artwork to be mounted, and the taste of the scroll-maker.

There are specific ways of rolling up, tying, and storing a scroll, and each scroll should have its own dedicated storage box.



For sale: New large oval Korean mica training pot

Description: This is a great pot for that *yamadori* or a large tree that the experts tell you to "put it in a bigger pot and let it grow for a few years..." Aside from their comparatively low cost, mica pots have three big advantages over ceramics: they weigh much less than a ceramic pot of the same size, they are virtually indestructible, and they can be safely drilled through for attaching guy-wires to pull branches down. Mica pots are hard to find in the USA now, since shipping costs have gone way up.

Wintering Workshop (November) ✨

At our November meeting, a panel of experts - John Cotaggio, Mike Pollock and Mike Humphrey - shared their knowledge and experience with club members. Then, members shared their tips and asked questions. Here are a few of the tips that were shared:

- Be vigilant! Check for water periodically. Use snow or water in the morning; check 8 times or so from Thanksgiving to March
- Apply fungicide, especially if you cover pots with leaves; try this - 5 tablespoons of Lime Sulfur to a gallon of water - avoid soil (cover with plastic bag)
- Ideally, after first frost - roots should stay frozen - but Mother Nature can change that!
- Use translucent plastic - not clear - don't want the plants to get too much sun; wintering deciduous in the dark is okay - but not evergreens, they grow all winter
- Remove moss - save that for shows - the health of the tree is more important

GOT RACOONS?

Try using mint or rosemary or mothballs. John also suggests this spray:

- 1 Gallon Water
- 1/2 bottle Hot Sauce
- Dash of Liquid Soap
