ART OF DISPLAYING TREES WITH MICHAEL HAGEDORN 12:30 PM ON FEBRUARY 9, 2008 AT THE BARTLETT ARBORETUM

It isn't often that YAMA KI members have the opportunity to have a learning session with a "local boy makes good" star. On February 9th we are pleased to have *Mr. Michael Hagedorn* share his knowledge of bonsai display with us.

Michael comes with a long history of designing and creating his own bonsai pots at Crataegus Studio after earning a Masters Degree in Ceramic Arts at State University in Alfred, NY. During the years of creating bonsai pots, Michael took time to do intensive bonsai studying with Mr. Boon Manakitivipart. Then to his surprise, he was accepted as an apprentice by Mr. Shinji Suzuki in Nagano, Japan. At a recent MidAtlantic Symposium Mr. Suzuki spoke very highly of Michael's talents, artistic eye, and some skills not bonsairelated.




Michael was honored by having seven trees which he wired as an apprentice shown at Kokufu Ten in Tokyo, two trees in the Taiken Ten, and one in the Sakafu Ten. He also

wired two of *Mr. Suzuki's* trees which won awards: one a Kokufu Prize and one a Prime Minister's Award. He now lives in Portland, Oregon where he creates and teaches bonsai and writes for major bonsai journals. Check out his website at www.crataegus.com.

STUDYING OUR OWN TREES WITH MARTY SCHMALENBERG

Marty Schmalenberg wasted no time at the January meeting sharing his approach to styling a tree. His own specialty is native North American trees. Although the United States was ahead of Europe in adopting bonsai, we now trail them in contemporary design and display. *Marty* stated that it appears that both Japanese and European bonsai artists regard much of American bonsai as a lagging step child.

The meeting was well attended with many trees put forth for Marty's guidance. The only tree not needing



Marty indicated that the very first item to look for in a potential or to-be-improved bonsai is to find its overall line. Trees read from right to left or left to right and you must find this direction as part of the preliminary search. The trunk line must not be convoluted. A sinuous line should look as though the tree had been stressed by nature and not look as though someone's hands had wired it to have some curves. "Guard against contrivance or disconnect"

was his dictum. Start by removing all crotch material and any twiggy dead branchlets. Too many branches tend to give a tree a "salad look" so eliminate branches that will not serve your design goal. This will open the tree for your further study. Then begin to wire. Wire precisely not just functionally. You can even display a tree which is correctly wired. As you determine your first branch also decide WHERE you want to place it. Do so, but do not continue to tweak it.

Some specifics to consider:

- deciduous, Larch, and Pines you can begin to wire and trim in February then you can repot them from March 15th to May. Air-layer starting about the 3rd week in March;
- remove lichen which is becoming too wide-spread by spraying with vinegar; algae killers are also available if you only have gourmet vinegar; also remove moss which can harm the tree while lichen does not;
- Miracle Grow[®] and Miracid[®], with fish emulsion added occasionally are his preferred fertilizers with mycorrhiza sprinkled monthly on ALL trees (stop October 1st); fertilize every 10-12 days at half strength. He finds that Miracle Grow[®] with changed proportions and frequency eliminates the need for Miracid[®];
 - watering more frequently for most trees is very effective;
 - a very useful cutting tool is a Masakuni[®] bonsai sword; it is not serrated and is exceptionally sharp.

Before the afternoon concluded *Mike Pollock* opened a raffle for a mame Ficus salicifolia which he donated. The charming little bonsai brought \$70 to our coffers.


Many species were submitted for critiquing and some members encouraged *Marty* to proceed and implement his suggested styling changes.
