A DAY WITH BERNI GASTRICH ON ALL PINES 11 AM “BYO” WORKSHOP, 1 PM LECTURE/DEMO MARCH 19, 2005 AT THE BARTLETT ARBORETUM

Berni Gastrich will attempt to do the definitive pine lecture: what to do and when to do it - for black, five needle, pitch, mugho, the Scots, etc. He will cover young versus old, de-candling, needle pulling, internode length, bud back, water, fertilizer, soil, mycorrhizza, etc. The program will help us understand that there are essentially two groups of pines and will help simplify our concerns with pine maintenance.

Come at 11:00 am and bring your pine/s (any kind) for individual advice to the morning workshop. There is no charge for the workshop - just bring your tools. The regular meeting will begin at 1:00 pm as usual.

Remember the Bonsai-Swap Meeting prior to our meeting. Bring your bonsai trees, pots, tools, etc. that you would like to trade or sell. Set up your materials in the back of the room.

FEBRUARY’S MEETING WITH MIKE POLLOCK

Mike cut back on the planned presentation of his trip to Japan to allow adequate time for *Colin Lewis’* Bonsai Design Exercise. He will make that presentation at another meeting. Instead, *Mike* presented slides of selected bonsai that he and *Bill Valavanis* photographed that impressed him and was sure we would want to see. It was almost equivalent to walking through a prized Japanese bonsai exhibit while sitting comfortably at the Arboretum.

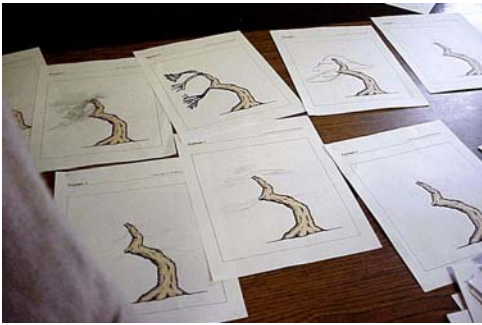


After the slide presentation, *Mike* handed each member a set of seven of *Colin Lewis’* copyrighted bonsai design drawings of

various shapes of bonsai trunks (3 sample trunks shown here, each shape on its own 8½” by 11” sheet. We were instructed to draw appropriate canopy forms or foliage masses to suit the various trunk shapes. We were told not to sign the drawings to save any potential embarrassment when the drawings were reviewed.



When we completed the drawings, *Mike* collected and sorted them so that all of the same-trunk-shape pages were together. He then spread them on a large table arranged so that drawings that were similar in concept were together.



Mike then critiqued the drawings using a set of answer guides prepared by *Colin*. *Colin* had indicated which canopy forms were successful, which satisfactory, and which unsuccessful for each trunk shape.

We are most appreciative of *Colin's* gift of these exercises which provided a novel and focused technique to improve our design abilities. We're sure he will be inundated with requests from bonsai clubs everywhere. *Mike* also earned our thanks for guiding us through the exercises.

BACK TO BASICS WITH BERNI

MARCH REPOTTING

The periphery versus core problem in soil which was addressed in February "Basics", can be helped in another way. When we repot, we first cut away the outer "basket" of encircling roots. Then we tease away the peripheral and bottom soil and again trim. *Yuji Yoshimura* taught us then to make several pie-shaped incursions into that central core soil so that some of the new soil gets close to the center. We often have to make blind cuts into the root system to accomplish this. The process is scary, dangerous, and often not done.

A very safe though messy way to accomplish the task is to take the tree outdoors and define your pie-shaped cuts with the water stream from a hose. Work from both above and below. Hosing will expose the roots in these areas, allowing you to use discretion in choosing which roots to cut.

Before putting the tree into the new pot, I am now applying Root Tone and mycorrhizza to the wet bare roots. My experience of the last two years seems to support these methods.

MIDATLANTIC BONSAI FESTIVAL ON THE HORIZON



In the last YAMA KI NEWSLETTER you read about the two American artists who will present programs, critiques, and workshops at the MidAtlantic's 22nd Spring Festival. This month we go abroad and east to introduce *Mr. David Prescott*, of Manchester, England. He has been involved in bonsai for the past twelve years and focuses on collected material from Scotland, Wales, and the Italian Alps. He has studied with European bonsai masters who have presented at MidAtlantic such as *Salvatore Liporace*, *Kevin Wilson*, and *Colin Lewis*. *David's* public presentations include the Ginko Exhibit, Brussels; the Chelsea Flower Show, London; and other European sites where he has been awarded gold medals. He is the author of the best selling book *The Bonsai Handbook* (with *Colin Lewis* as consulting editor). *David* will present two lecture/demonstrations: Saturday's with a San Jose Juniper and Sunday morning's with an Eastern white pine. Both trees will be raffled. His appearance with MidAtlantic includes a critique of the Exhibit on Saturday afternoon and a workshop on Sunday afternoon using San Jose juniper.

Have you registered yet? Early registration fees are in effect prior to April 1. The conference will be at the Ramada Inn, East Hanover, NJ, from Friday, April 15 through Sunday, April 17. And don't forget access to major vendors and chatting time with the artists!

GLEANINGS

Howard McNeal (Susquehanna Bonsai Club Newsletter, January 2005):

- ✿ Keep the top of the tree light. Heavier growth will fatten smaller branches and this is not desirable at the top of the trees. Conversely, leave a lower branch on the tree to fatten the trunk.
- ✿ A way to wire a lot of trees into a pot is to make a bamboo stick raft and secure it to the bottom of the pot. The raft can be used as a place to secure many trees.
