APRIL'S DINNER MEETING WITH STEVE TOLLEY



By arrangement, *Steve Tolley* arrived from Binghampton, England before his engagement as one of the featured artists at the MidAtlantic Bonsai Societies Spring Festival. YAMA KI had the privilege of an intimate meeting with *Steve* at our evening dinner meeting the day before the Festival.

Steve reminded us that bonsai is one of the few creative activities that has four dimensions. In addition to the usual three (length, width, and depth) there is the forth - time! Bonsai styling and maintenance is a continuous process. While styling today you must take into consideration the future - from a compositional as well as horticultural perspective!

Mike Pollock brought a mature collected American larch to serve as the demo material. After studying the tree, *Steve* stated that there was not sufficient time to style the tree to its full potential and indicated what he could do now to enhance it as a bonsai. After a brief discussion, members present voted for him to describe what he would do if time permitted.

The tree had some large heavy branches at odd angles and wrong places. *Steve* said to change the positions of the branches would take hours, but that with steam he could accomplish it in minutes -- yes, with steam, even with using a wall-paper steam remover. Using bags and wet cloths to protect the trunk and foliage, you apply the steam at the bending point for about three minutes, and the branch will bend quickly and easily. Then use a guy wire to hold the branch in place as it cools and dries. In fact, if you apply the steam too long, the branch will droop. He also recommended using a creme brulee burner to smooth old wood jin and shari.

He then proceeded to critique the best and worst features of the tree and to style accordingly, within the time constraints., using raffia, wire, and muscles. We hope *Mike* will bring the tree to a meeting next spring to show us how time and his bonsai experience have enhanced the bonsai.

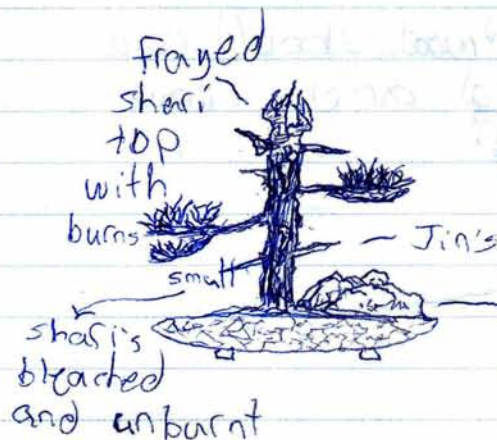
The Lightning Style

The lightning style depicts a tree that has been struck by lightning in the wild. Creating the lightning style on a bonsai can be very dangerous as it involves burning and cracking the tree which may harm or even kill the tree if not done correctly. The method can be used to shorten a collected tree if you do not want a broom style. Be aware do all ~~the~~ deadwood burning before bleaching with a powerfull mix of lime and sulfur. This style will not represent a tree exactly for the small shari's will not appear on a full sized tree. The style is best used on pines, and or conifers.

Instructions for Lightning Style

read (2) before doing (1)

(1) decide a proper cut line that is diagonal



(2) select a maximum of 3 branches to be kept on the tree.



(3) The rest of the branches should be pruned. That is those that are below the cut line.



(4) The wood above the cut line should now be cut off.



(5) Now create a large shari about 3 inches long around the cut creating deadwood.



(6) The deadwood should now be cracked and frayed



(7) Now burn parts of the existing deadwood.

⑧. now move down the trunk creating small sharis. The sharis should cut deep so they will not heal.



⑨. Bleach all sharis. With a mixture of lime and sulfur.
