ANNUAL ELECTIONS & AUCTION AT HOME OF ANN & BERNI GASTRICH AUGUST 9, 2003 1:00 PM

Our August business meeting and auction is combined with a home visit at the *Gastrichs*. All members will enjoy *Ann & Berni's* beautiful home and garden and especially their bonsai collection and display. Their bonsai collection and setting is an inspiration for all of us. New members should schedule this meeting as a must - not only for the home visit, but to fill in their bonsai needs at minimal cost at the auction. All are welcome to come an hour early and picnic if the weather cooperates. Bring a chair and park on the road. There will be a guided tour of the Bonsai Collection at 12:30.

Many members have plants that do not “talk” to them and are not completely happy with the results of their styling. This presents opportunities for other members who can purchase the plants at auction prices, well below their market value, and then feel free to experiment and/or modify the styling dramatically. Some members take the auction opportunity to remove duplicate tools, containers, books, wire, etc. from their collections and receive tax credits for their donations. Many containers and some tools and books from *Marion Gyllenswan's* collection are already in hand for the auction. Bonsai created by some of our visiting artists during their demonstrations in the recent past will also be auctioned.

Members who have more expensive bonsai may elect to sell rather than donate their plants at the auction. In these cases, members may set a minimum bid and if the plant is sold, donate 10% of the proceeds to the club.

Marion's family is contributing most of her bonsai related possessions to the National Bonsai Foundation and the bonsai clubs in which she maintained memberships. Our auction proceeds of *Marion's* bonsai items will go to the National Bonsai Foundation toward a fund that has been started in her memory

THE POLLOCKS HOST JULY "MEETING"

On a beautiful, sunny July afternoon approximately two dozen YAMA KI members with several HoYoku members enjoyed a leisurely barbecue dinner at *Roz and Mike Pollack's* lovely home.

The gathering started off with a demonstration by *Colin Lewis* of carving using Dremel and Mikita tools. The HoYoku group had spent the day on jinn and shari on their personal trees, under *Colin's* guidance. The demonstration plant was a rescued yew, that had a tiny sprig of life on one side. *Melba* had gotten it from the dumpster across the street when some neighbor's had radical landscaping done last October. After cutting off a number of stubs, one long branch was carved to indicate a long period of rot, leaving a long comma-shaped (looking at a cross section of the branch) horizontal jinn. *Colin* worked on this piece as well as cutting back a lower branch stub for further carving. Most of the tree was lime-sulfured in the early afternoon after the bark had been cleaned off. Future plans include a phoenix graft if the yew doesn't survive.



After the carving demonstration in the shady driveway, we adjourned to the patio where a grill had been set-up and hotdogs, hamburgers, and chicken were in plentiful supply. There were new members, old members, and guests, all of whom enjoyed the meal and opportunity for conversation. Many thanks to *Roz and Mike* for their hospitality.

BACK TO BASICS WITH BERNI

THIS OF ONE THOSE: “WHY DIDN’T I EVER THINK OF THIS BEFORE.”

For years I have carefully laid out my tools before working on a tree only to find that after a while I am spending time searching, each time I put one down and need a different one. Stupid, but exasperating.

While it is not a perfect solution, the following has helped tremendously. Wire handling tools, e.g. cutters and pliers go to the left of the tree. Trimming and wood cutting tools go to the right of the tree. [editor’s note: lefties reverse]. While my personal collection of tools would put a smile on Mr. Masakuni’s face, I find there are four tools, I use by far, the most: a wire cutter, wire handling pliers (also used in jin making), a pointed scissor, and a concave cutter. These are my closest left and right side tools. All related tools are put on the appropriate side but further out. Sounds almost stupidly simple doesn’t it? I predict you will remember this Basics more than any previous one, if you try it once!

Have you ever mixed your tools with those of others at a workshop? Solution: all hardware stores sell a special paint product for dipping handles. When dry it gives them a nice grippy feel, and it comes in colors! Pick a color and do it.

YAMA KI/NEW YORK BOTANICAL GARDEN BONSAI EXHIBIT

Mark the dates on your calendar for our bonsai exhibit at the New York Botanical Garden. Set-up will take place on Thursday, October 16th. The exhibit will run until the end of the week-end following, Sunday, October 26th. Plan the dates when you can volunteer as docent and earmark the bonsai in your collection that you wish to prepare as a candidate for the exhibit. If possible, bring the plant to the August or September meeting for the Committee to consider. Don’t be shy! If it is difficult to bring to the meeting, submit a photograph and if it appears to be suitable, the Committee will come to your home to make the evaluation. The process can help elevate your skills and sensitize your artistic talents further.
